### **EARLY 1970'S**

- \* Research explodes showing benefits of quality early care
- \* WV Governor and Department of Education provide state funds for early childhood demonstration center in Huntington
- Norma Gray founds the program, with help of Mary Ann Hale. Board is selected.
- ❖ Two new centers for children ages 3 and 4 open, one in Cabell County and one in Kanawha County



#### MID TO LATE 1970'S


❖ Programming established to help children with autism and other disabilities

\* Teacher training programs established to enhance skills of teachers serving young children.

\* Programs are formed to work with families of young children


❖ Interagency collaboration expands

Variety of family trainings are provided



#### THE 1980'S

- ❖ Agency is up to 53 employees in 1980
- \* Agency helps establish new child care centers until they can become selfsustaining
- \* Food program begins to help home-based child care providers optimize nutrition
- ❖ Annual Early Childhood Conference is established
- Dunbar's early learning center is first in W.Va. to get national accreditation



#### THE 1990'S

- ❖ Agency formally adopts the name River Valley Child Development Services
- Serves 900 children and families with 100 staff
- School-age programs are first offered
- \* Apprenticeship for Child Development Specialist program founded, sanctioned by departments of Education and Labor
- \* LINK founded to give more families access to care
- Enterprise Child Development Center opens



## THE 2000'S

- Services expanded to all 55 counties in WV
- River Valley website is developed
- Choices and Connect Child Care Resource andReferral begin to promote availability of quality care
- Training Connections and Resources expands to provide training opportunities statewide including statewide conferences, nurse health consultants, T.E.A.C.H scholarship and WV STARS.



#### THE 2000'S

\*WV Birth to Three funded to help infants through 3year-olds with developmental delays

\*River Valley moves to current location on 7th Ave.

Centers establish first Pre-K programs

Tuition Investment Program Support (TIPS) begins offering child care assistance to families
